

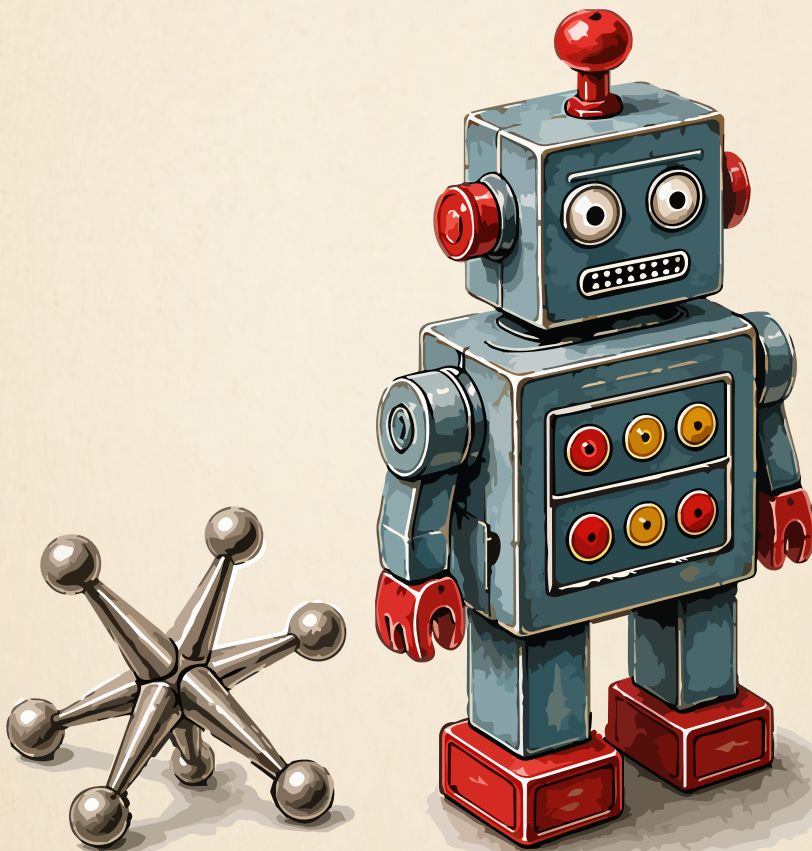

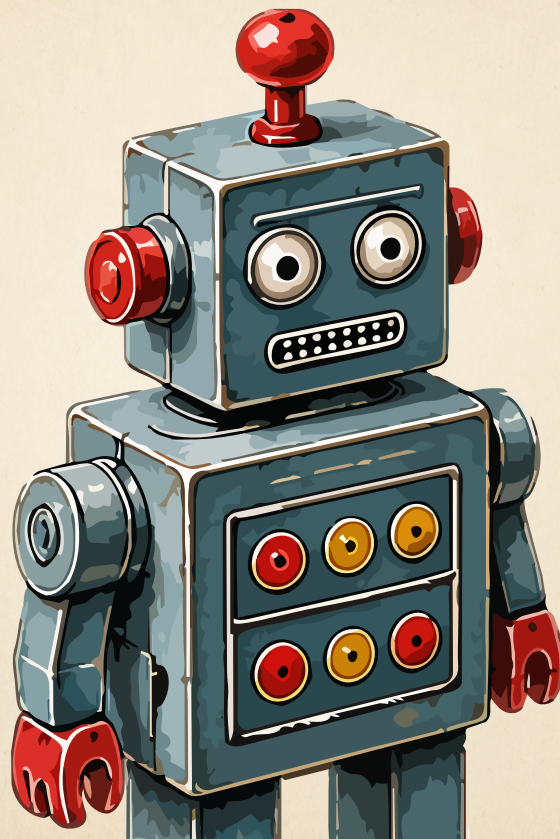

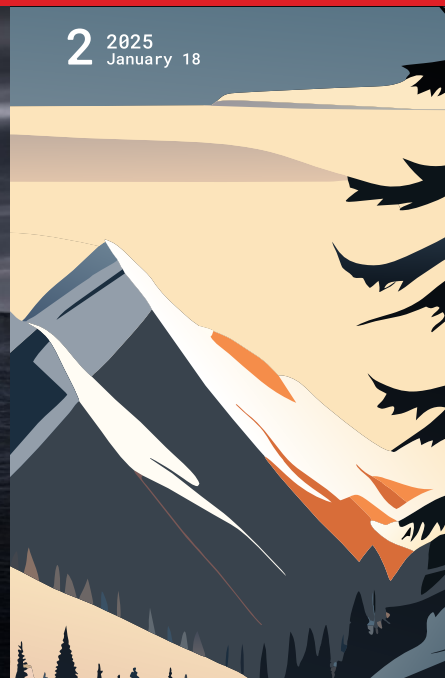

Together, those ideas create movement - building insight, confidence and **momentum** toward what comes next...



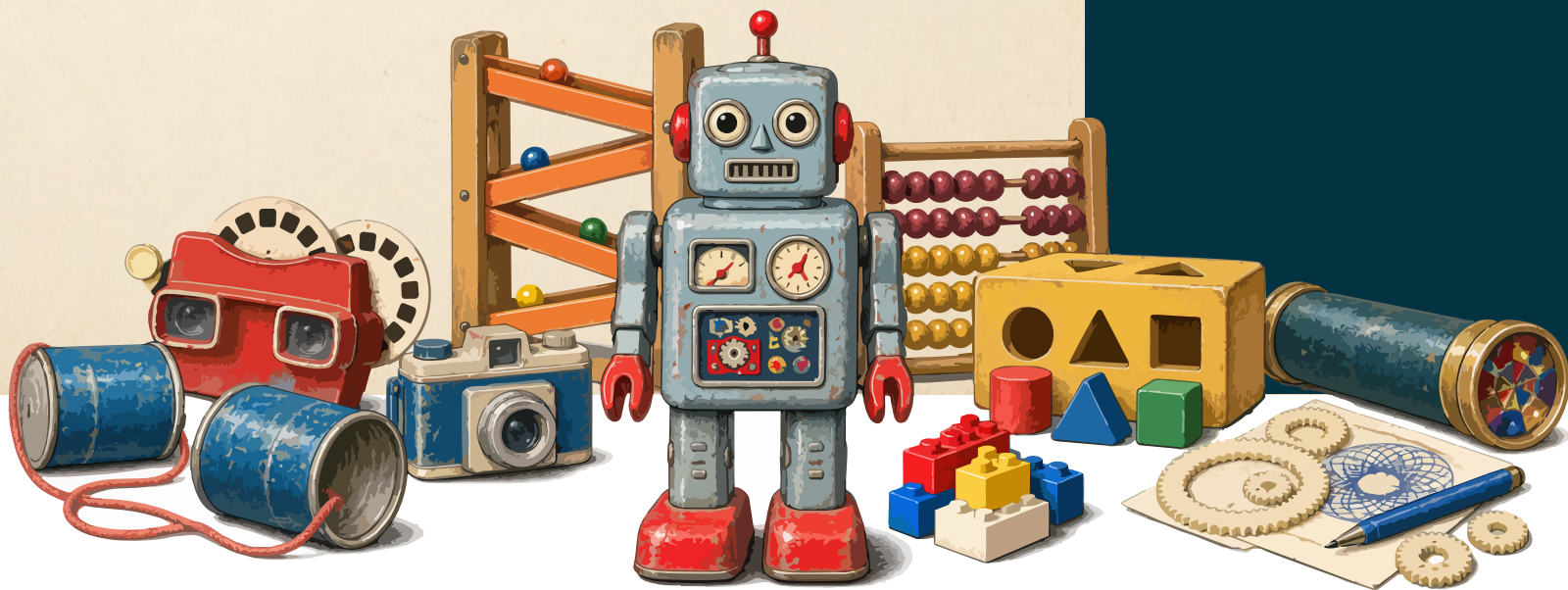

Now, her mission has shifted from educating patients to educating the people who care for them, helping dental professionals improve their own quality of life and business performance.

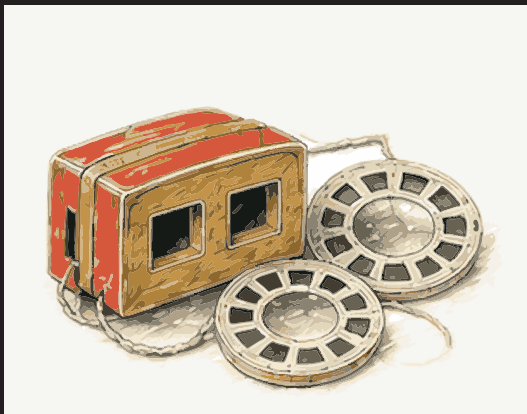

THE SESSION

Pediatric dentistry has traditionally relied on qualitative clinical judgement to diagnose disease and guide treatment. We describe lesions as "small" or "large," children as "high risk" or "low risk," and monitor changes based largely on visual assessment and clinical experience. But as technology advances, are we ready to move beyond simply describing disease to actually measuring it?

This presentation explores how pediatric dentistry is beginning to transition from subjective observation toward objective, quantitative diagnosis. Through advances in caries risk assessment, oral microbiome research, quantitative imaging, artificial intelligence, and digital diagnostics, we are taking important steps toward more individualized patient care.

Using clinical examples and emerging research, Dr. Tsang will discuss how measurable biological and clinical data may transform the way we diagnose disease, monitor lesion progression, evaluate treatment outcomes, and tailor preventive and restorative care to each child. Participants will gain practical insights into technologies that are already influencing clinical practice, those on the horizon, and how these innovations may shape the future of pediatric dentistry.

ABOUT PHOEBE

Dr. Phoebe Tsang is a Certified Specialist in Pediatric Dentistry practising in the Greater Vancouver area. She received her Doctor of Dental Medicine degree from the University of British Columbia before completing a PhD in Oral Biology, followed by specialty training in Pediatric Dentistry at UCLA.

She serves as an Associate Professor in the UBC Graduate Pediatric Dentistry Program and is an attending pediatric dentist at BC Children's Hospital.

One of Dr. Tsang's primary areas of interest is advancing pediatric dentistry toward individualized, evidence-based patient care. She is particularly interested in how objective measurements and quantitative diagnostics can help personalize prevention, diagnosis, and treatment for every child.

Outside of dentistry, Dr. Tsang is the proud mother of two children, who continually remind her that no two children learn, grow, or thrive in exactly the same way. As both a pediatric dentist and a parent, she believes that our science should reflect the reality that every child deserves care guided by objective measurements and tailored to their individual needs. This philosophy continues to inspire her interest in the future of individualized pediatric dentistry.

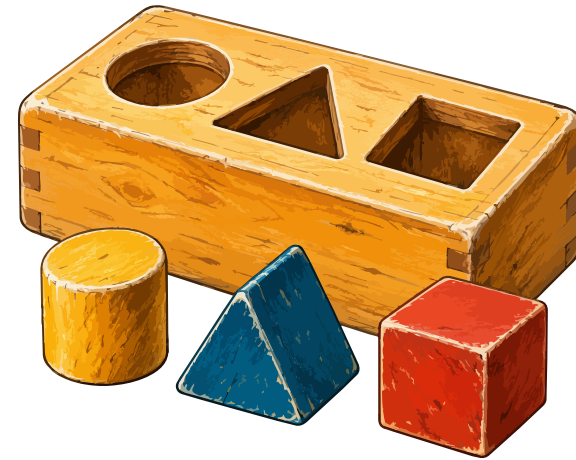
THE SESSION

The North American population is aging and most dental practices have significant portions of their patient pool over the age of 65. There is great clinical heterogeneity amongst older adults, ranging from functionally independent to frail to functionally dependent.

Multimorbidity, polypharmacy, and frailty contribute to functional decline in older adults and increase the risk of rapid oral health deterioration. Declines in cognition can affect patient co-operation for dental procedures, consent, and daily oral hygiene. Managing the dental needs of frail and functionally dependent older adults presents numerous clinical challenges in terms of treatment planning and treatment delivery. In this lecture, practical tips and rational treatment planning concepts for frail older adults will be discussed.

Dr. Nicholas Tong BHSc, DDS, MSc, FSCD, FACD is an Assistant Professor of Teaching at the UBC Faculty of Dentistry in the Division of Prosthodontics and Dental Geriatrics. Dr. Tong graduated with BHSc degree from McMaster University, a DDS degree from the University of Toronto, a GPR certificate from the University of Alberta Hospital, and a MSc (Craniofacial Science) degree from UBC. He is a staff dentist with the UBC Geriatric Dentistry Program, treating frail and functionally dependent patients in Long-Term Care. Dr. Tong is Chair of the Geriatric Dentistry Committee with the British Columbia Dental Association, a Fellow with the Special Care Dentistry Association and American College of Dentists, and a Director at Large with the American Society for Geriatric Dentistry.

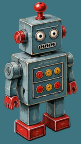

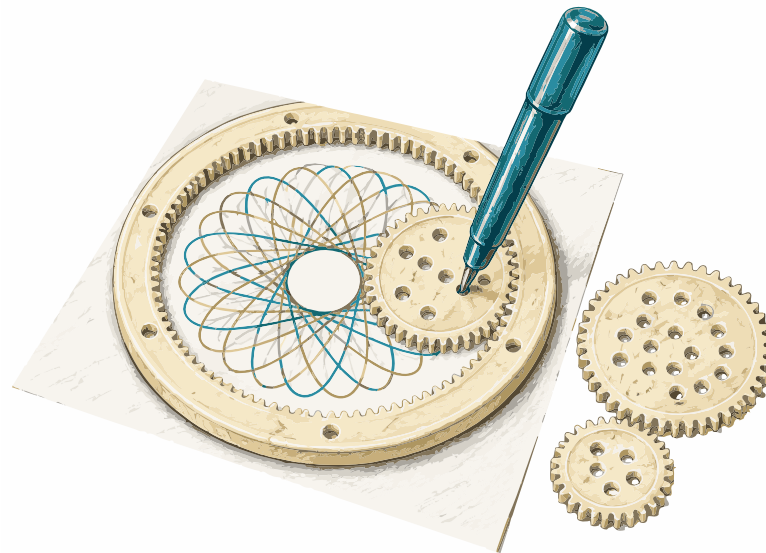

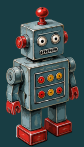

If you, a family member, or a patient were about to lose a front tooth, in the next minutes, days, and months ... would you know exactly what is required to maximize the chance of a successful and an ideal esthetic outcome?



THE SESSION

This lecture presents an integrated surgical-restorative approach to predictable, high-esthetic anterior implant outcomes. Anchored by the practical decision question posed to clinicians and families, the session walks the entire team through focused assessment, logical treatment sequencing, and the critical but often overlooked steps before, during, and after extraction and implant placement. Participants will learn biologic and prosthetic techniques designed to preserve or augment facial bone and soft tissue, recreate papillae, and shape natural emergence profiles. Content emphasizes evidence-informed decision making, actionable tips for common and challenging scenarios, and clear patient-staff communication strategies to align expectations with feasible clinical results.

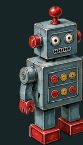
